Increase in scale and specialisation

There were 77 thousand farms and agricultural businesses in the Netherlands in 2007. In 1995 there were still as many as 113 thousand. Smaller farms in particular are going out of business, and large farms are becoming even larger. The number of cattle farms, for example, halved in the period 1995–2007 to 21.5 thousand. The number of livestock kept on these farms fell by 20 percent. This pushed up the average number of cattle per farm from 110 to 150 animals. The number of pig farms also fell by half, to just over 4 thousand. The number of pigs per pig farm rose from 1,200 to 2,150, however. In nearly all other sectors of agriculture, too, farms are increasing in size. The agricultural production of farms going out of business is taken over seamlessly by those who carry on.

Farmers are also specialising more and more. In livestock farming, too, specialisation increased in the period 1995–2007. In 2007, 77 percent of all pigs and 75 percent of all chickens were kept on specialised farms. In 1995 this was still only 64 and 72 percent respectively. The share of cattle kept on specialised farms remained around 85 percent in this period.

Less organic farming

Organic agriculture accounted for nearly 40 thousand hectares in the Netherlands in 2007, 1,344 hectares less than in 2006. This puts the share of the organically farmed area in the total Dutch agricultural area at 2.1 percent. Arable farming showed the largest drop in the area used for organic products, with 1,500 hectares, a 16 percent decrease. The area used for organic horticultural products did increase by 275 hectares (+24 percent).

Compared with other European countries, the organic sector is small in the Netherlands. The share of the total agricultural area used for organic farming is much larger in Austria (11 percent) and Italy (8 percent). On average, countries of the European Union use 4 percent of agricultural land for organic farming.








1.12 Specialised cattle farms



1.13 Specialised pig farms




1.14 Specialised chicken farms





Many new houses completed in 2007

More than 80 thousand new homes were completed in the Netherlands in 2007, the highest number for nearly ten years. More apartments, in particular, were completed. The number of apartments in the rent sector was 15 percent higher than in 2006, the number intended for buyers no less than 28 percent higher. The number of completed family homes was 5 percent higher. Another 7 thousand homes were added to the housing stock as a result of conversions and renovations. On the other hand, nearly 24 thousand homes were withdrawn from the housing stock as a result of demolition etc. The net housing stock grew by nearly 64 thousand dwellings in 2007, to 7.03 million.

The recovery in non-residential construction in 2006 continued into 2007. The value of building permits for company buildings rose by 10 percent. The value of glasshouses and company concourses, in particular, was higher.

Construction turnover up 10 percent in 2007

Turnover in the construction industry was 10 percent higher in 2007 than in 2006, topping 80 billion euro for the first time. Turnover was substantially up in all branches of construction compared with 2006. Installation companies booked the best results, with an increase of over 10 percent. In the largest branch, residential and non-residential construction, turnover grew by 10 percent, in civil engineering it rose by just over 7 percent.




2.3 Turnover in the construction industry, 12-month moving average







3. Education

Higher overall education level

The education level of the Dutch population aged 15–65 years is steadily increasing. In the period 1997–2006, the share of people with only primary school as highest level of completed education fell from 12 to 9 percent, while the share who had graduated from higher education rose from 19 to 25 percent. The number of women with higher education increased in particular in 2007. Within senior secondary vocational education (*mbo*), a shift is noticeable to higher level courses. Most *mbo* students used to do courses at levels 2 and 3. In 2005 and 2006 this shifted to level 4.

Relatively many mature students in apprenticeships

There were 496 thousand students in senior secondary vocational education (*mbo*) in school year 2006/'07. Most of them (72 percent) were in the *bol* track, which means they spend most of their time at school and work in traineeships for certain periods. The other 28 percent were in the *bbl* track, which entails working as an apprentice with an employer and going to school for one or two days a week. In the latter track, 37 percent of the students were 25 years or older. Courses in the health and social care sector, in particular, were popular among these mature students. Nearly four in ten were even older than 35 years. In the *bol* track, only 5 percent of students are older than 25 years.

Education spending up to 30 billion euro

Dutch spending on education amounted to nearly 30 billion euro in 2006, 5.3 percent more than in 2005. Government spending on senior secondary vocational education (*mbo*) in particular has risen in recent years. On average, staff costs accounted for three-quarters of costs for educational institutions.







Over three-quarters of a million enterprises

More than 761 thousand enterprises were registered in the Netherlands on 1 January 2007. Just over 90 percent of them had fewer than 10 employees; they constitute the category small companies. Medium-sized companies, employing 10 to 100 employees, account for around 9 percent. Only 1 percent of enterprises employ 100 people or more. These are the large enterprises.

Relatively many energy and water suppliers fall in the categories medium-sized and large companies. One in five manufacturing companies are medium-sized.

Small enterprises are predominant in agriculture and services, accounting for 98 and 92 percent respectively. They are rarest in manufacturing, with only 77 percent.

ICT sector continues to grow

The ICT sector has been benefiting from the economic growth since 2004. Investment, production and value added have all risen, especially in ICT services. The demand for workers in this sector has also increased considerably in recent years. The number of vacancies at enterprises providing computer services, for example, was higher at the end of 2007 (9,800) than it has been since the dotcom stock market hype in 2001.

Investment set to rise in 2008

Manufacturing enterprises expect to invest around 4 percent more capital in 2008 than in 2007. Most branches of manufacturing are positive about investment spending. Only companies producing food, drink and tobacco products foresee a decrease in investment in 2008. Companies in mineral extraction and energy and water companies are positive on the other hand. They expect to increase investment by 24 and 45 percent respectively.




4.5 Job vacancies in enterprises providing computer services

High growth for business services in 2007

The growth observed in turnover in business services in 2006 continued at the same level in 2007. Compared with the previous year, turnover for the whole sector was up 10 percent. The growth did level off in the course of the year though. Total value added in financial and business services amounted to just over 88 billion euro in 2006.

The percentage of women working in financial and business services varies between the various branches. Women account for nearly half the workforce in financial and legal services, for example, while in computer and IT services they have only 20 percent of the jobs.


Investment by institutional investors growing faster than GDP

Investment by institutional investors rose by 7 percent in 2006, to 1,149 billion euro. Just as in 2004 and 2005, a large part of this increase was the result of higher share prices. This pushed up the relative significance of shares in total investment further, to 47 percent. Since 2003, the increase in investment by institutional investors has been larger than the increase in the gross domestic product (GDP). The total amount of investments rose from 168 percent of GDP at the end of 2002 to 215 percent of GDP at the end of 2006.

Effects of health insurance for non-life insurance companies

The figures for 2006 are the first to include the new medical care insurance companies (former state funds and former private health insurance companies). These companies came into existence when the new health care insurance act came into effect in 2006. As a result, there have been significant changes in the branch of non-life insurance covering illness and accidents. The new basic health insurance is considered as a form of social insurance, not indemnity insurance. The item receivables on the balance sheet is 10 billion euro higher, and indemnity provisions are 1 billion euro lower. The amounts of premiums and payments are also 4 billion euro lower.





5.17 Turnover in business services, 2007 (change on previous year)




5.18 Costs and profits in business servcies, 2005

Tax revenues continue substantial growth in 2006

Revenues from central government taxes amounted to 125 billion in 2006, 7.8 percent more than in 2005. Improvements on the labour market and a hefty increase in spending pushed up income from wage tax and value added tax by millions of euros. The favourable economic situation also put nearly 1 billion euro more in corporate taxes in government coffers in 2006, in spite of the lower rates for these taxes.

Value added tax amounted to 39 billion euro in 2006. This is the net amount that ended up in the treasury. Part of VAT revenues have to be paid to the European Union: 0.9 billion euro in 2006.

Stronger rise in government spending

Government spending amounted to 129 billion euro in 2006, just over 5 percent more than in 2005, when it rose by 2.6 percent. Spending on social provisions rose by 4.7 billion euro. This increase was mainly caused by the introduction of the health care allowance. The government also put 1.6 billion euro extra into the state old age pension fund, so that the premium for the state pension could remain unchanged. More money was also spent on rent allowances, and on childcare. The termination of the old government health insurance scheme cut government spending on health care by 2.9 billion euro. This was offset by a contribution of 1.9 billion euro to a new care insurance fund for children younger than 18 years.

Higher local taxes


Municipalities expect to increase their revenues from taxes and levies by nearly 4.4 percent in 2008. Sewage charges and property tax, in particular, are set to rise. Taxes for property owners will rise by more than for tenants. Sewage charges are expected to rise by 6.4 percent. In relative terms, revenues from municipal and construction fees will increase by most. Construction fees will generate 10 percent more; municipal fees 11 percent more.

6.1 Current account of central government by category (mln euro)



7. Health and welfare

Fewer hospital admissions following heart attack

Twelve per 10 thousand inhabitants in the Netherlands were admitted to hospital following a acute heart infarct in 2005. This is 17 percent less than in 2000. The decrease was stronger for men (19 percent) than for women (13 percent). The reduction in hospital admissions may be accounted for by the lower percentage of people with raised cholesterol levels. This in turn is the result of an increase in the use of cholesterol reducing drugs. But lifestyle changes, such as reduced smoking by men and a lower intake of trans fats, may also be a factor in the lower number of acute heart infarcts.

The total number per 10 thousand inhabitants admitted to hospital at least once for all causes did rise in the period 2000–2005, by 19 percent. This increase mainly took place after 2001, when extra funds were made available to reduce waiting lists.

Around 241 thousand people do not have medical insurance

On 1 May 2006, some 241 thousand people were not insured for the costs of medical treatment. This is 1.5 percent of the Dutch population. These uninsured included around 40 thousand children, mainly in families that did not have medical insurance. About half of people without insurance were in their twenties and thirties. Men were slightly more likely not be uninsured than women: of all people without insurance, 57 percent were men and boys

Care expenditure up by more than 5 percent in 2006

Spending on health care and welfare amounted to 72.2 billion euro in 2006. This is 5.4 percent more than in 2005. The rise can be attributed to the increase in the volume of care supplied, higher wage costs in care institutions, higher fees in the free professions and a new financial system for general practitioners. Following a number of years of stabilisation in the growth rate of the volume of care, volume growth picked up strength again in 2006.





Purchasing power down slightly in 2005

Overall, the purchasing power of the Dutch population fell by 0.3 percent in 2005. For self-employed people and their families it rose by 1 percent, and for employees, too, it increased slightly (0.2 percent). For people who were not active on the labour market, however, purchasing power was lower: they had to make do with 1 percent less. In 2003 and 2004, too, this group was worse off than people who had a job.

Optimism about own financial situation in 2007

The share of households reporting that their financial situation had improved in the preceding twelve months rose in 2007 for the second year in a row. The percentage who said it had deteriorated was lower. As a result, the number of households reporting an improvement (20 percent) approached the number reporting a decline (22 percent). Households were also more positive about their financial future. For the first time since 2000, the percentage who expected an improvement in the coming twelve months (19 percent) was higher than the percentage foreseeing a deterioration (14 percent).

Highest incomes in North Holland and Utrecht

Bloemendaal was again the richest municipality in the Netherlands in 2005. Average income in this municipality, located in the province North Holland, was 67 percent higher than the national average. Not much changed in the municipal income rankings between 2001 and 2005. Inhabitants in municipalities in North Holland and Utrecht are still relatively wealthy, those in Groningen and Friesland relatively poor. At the top of the list, Wassenaar and Blaricum follow Bloemendaal. The bottom of the list includes the municipalities Reiderland, Pekela and Eemsmond, all in Groningen, where income was 23 to 16 percent below the national average.





Smaller increase in international trade

The volume of imports and exports of goods rose by less in 2007 than in 2006. Imports were up 6 percent and exports 8 percent. In 2006 both grew by 10 percent. Import prices rose by 2 percent in 2007, export prices by 1 percent. The value of imports and exports rose by 7 and 9 percent respectively.

Compared with 2006, exports to countries outside the European Union rose by more than exports within the EU (12 percent and 8 percent respectively). Imports from EU countries rose by significantly more (10 percent) than imports from outside the EU (5 percent).

Trade surplus hits new record

The surplus on the balance of trade rose by 7.5 billion euro to a record 41 billion euro in 2007. Exporters of chemical, food and machinery products accounted for the bulk of the surplus. The balance of trade with the United Kingdom, France, Italy, Poland, Spain, Denmark and Nigeria rose most substantially. The trade deficit with China increased again: it was 23 billion euro in 2007, nearly 3 billion euro more than in 2006.

Further growth for international trade in services

The value of Dutch trade in services with the rest of the world was nearly 153 billion euro in 2007. This is an increase of 4 percent on 2006. The value of exports rose by 5 percent, that of imports by 3 percent. Countries outside the EU accounted for nearly half of the increase in total exports. Switzerland, in particular, contributed strongly to this. Exports to this country were 21 percent higher than in 2006. The increase consisted mainly of royalties and other business services.






9.5 Percentage of continents in Dutch imports and exports, 2007 *

Buoyant labour market

The situation on the Dutch labour market was very positive in 2007. The prospering economy pushed up employment, and fewer people claimed social benefits. The demand for labour increased substantially. The number of job vacancies hit a record level in the course of the year, and unemployment dropped sharply.

More people in work

The employed labour force rose by 185 thousand in 2007, to nearly 7.3 million people. The gross participation rate, the percentage of 15–64 year-olds active on the labour market, also rose. Employment rose in the older segments of the labour force in particular. Among 55–64 year-olds the gross participation grew from 42 percent in 2006 to 45 percent in 2007. The favourable labour market conditions pushed down unemployment by nearly 70 thousand people. As a result only 4.5 percent of the labour force were unemployed in 2007. In 2006 this was still 5.5 percent.

Lowest number of income support claimants for more than 25 years

The number of people claiming income support fell further, to 305 thousand in 2007, 25 thousand fewer than in the previous year. The number of income support claimants has not been this low for 25 years. The number of incapacity benefits, too, was lower. At the end of 2007, 847 thousand people were receiving an incapacity benefit, of whom 38 thousand under the new law on work and income (WIA) which replaced the old disability act (WAO) on 1 January 2006.

Collectively negotiated wage rates rise in the course of 2007

The increasing labour shortage was only reflected in higher wage demands in the second half of 2007. In the first half of the year, the increase in collectively negotiated wage rates was 1.7 percent, in the second half it shot up to 2.4 percent. The overall increase in 2007 was 2.1 percent, around the same as in 2006. The rise in contractual wage costs was nearly the same as the wage increase, as employer-paid premiums remained unchanged from 2006.





10.5 Vacancy rate by sector of industry, 31 December




10.6 Jobs of employees per province, 31 December 2005* (change on previous year)




10.11 Net labour participation, 2007







Dutch spend half their holidays in their own country

The Dutch population took nearly 35 million holidays in 2006. Just over half of these were spent in their own country. Just as in the preceding years, France was the most popular destination for holidays abroad, followed closely by Germany and Belgium. Many holidaymakers also headed for the Mediterranean, with Spain, Italy, Greece and Turkey the favoured destinations. For holidays outside Europe, more people travelled to the United States and the Caribbean.

Larger audiences for the performing arts

The performing arts staged more than 47 thousand performances in 2005, 9 percent more than in 2002. For the first time in two years, audience numbers were up. At more than 16 million, total attendance was slightly higher than in 2002. Music, in particular, attracted larger audiences: just over six in ten of people attending performances went to music or music theatre productions. The strongest growth was in the category cabaret and variety performances. These attracted 15 percent more theatregoers than in 2002. Audiences for dance and the category 'other performing arts' decreased considerably, on the other hand.

Net telephony used by one quarter of Internet users

Net telephony has increased substantially. While still only 6 percent of Internet users used their computer to phone via Skype of MSN messenger in 2005, in 2007 this had risen to one quarter of Internet users. People aged under 25 years in particular used this new Internet service. With the rise in Internet telephony, fewer people communicated via chat sites

Internet was also used more to listen to the radio, watch TV and read or download newspapers.

In 2007, nine out of ten people in the Netherlands had access to the Internet at home.



Highest economic growth since 2000

The Dutch economy grew by 3.5 percent in 2007, the highest growth rate since 2000. The economy in the Netherlands performed better than the main economies in Europe such as those in Germany, France and the United Kingdom. A wide range of factors contributed to the high growth in 2007. Just as in the preceding years, exports were the main factor, with a noticeable strong increase in exports of products manufactured in the Netherlands. In addition, investment spending and household consumption were important contributors. Although consumer confidence dropped sharply in September, spending by households was still higher overall in 2007 than in 2006. Consumers spent substantially more on durables such as clothing, electronics, and furniture. Companies invested widely in machines, new company buildings and computers in 2007. The economic growth was reflected in a further improvement on the labour market: the number of jobs rose strongly, unemployment fell and job vacancies reached a new record. Average wage rises remained modest, but did increase in the course of the year.

Consumers borrow just as much as in 2006

Dutch consumers borrowed 10.4 billion euro in consumer loans in 2007. This is the same amount as in 2006. The amount of new consumer credit has been fluctuating around 10.4 billion euro since the beginning of the century. Repayments have been rising in recent years. In 2007 the Dutch repaid 12.4 billion euro. Again this is more than loans granted and interest, so that the total outstanding debt was slightly lower again in 2007. As current account overdrafts did increase further, however, the total consumer debt of households did rise. Overdrafts of Dutch consumers were 8 percent higher at the end of 2007 than twelve months previously. Many people take advantage of the credit facility on their current accounts.








12.26 GDP per capita, 2005* (Netherlands=100)

Manufacturing turnover and output continue to rise

The Dutch manufacturing industry contributed substantially to economic growth in 2007. Like 2006, last year was a good one for this sector. Turnover and production grew by 8.5 and nearly 3 percent respectively. Producers' confidence was higher on average in 2007 than in the previous year. The business sentiment among manufacturers has been buoyant since mid 2006. In the first half of 2007, the increase in manufacturing turnover was mainly the result of the larger volume of sales. In the last six months it was mainly caused by higher prices. In food and oil refining, in particular, prices of end products were much higher. Sales of Dutch products abroad grew by nearly 8 percent; domestic sales by 9 percent.

Production was higher in all sectors of manufacturing. It grew by most in the petroleum, chemical, rubber and synthetics industry: 3.5 percent. The metal, electrical engineering and transport equipment sector also did well, with a production increase of just under 3.5 percent.


Less renewable electricity produced

The production of renewable electricity fell from 6.5 percent of domestic electricity consumption in 2006 to 6.0 percent in 2007. This is the result of a substantial drop in the amount of biomass cofired in electricity plants. In 2007 the amount of biomass cofired was just under half that in the previous year. In the period 2003-2005, cofiring of biomass rose fourfold. Biomass input in the production of renewable energy varies strongly. It is affected by a number of strongly fluctuating factors such as subsidy rates, the price of biomass, the price of the fossil fuel it replaces, the public debate on sustainability of biomass, and the stoppage of large electricity plants for maintenance. Electricity generated by wind turbines rose by one quarter in 2007. Wind energy accounted for half of renewable energy production, and is now the main source of renewable energy in the Netherlands.







13.6 Costs and operating results in the manufacturing industry, 2005





Climate change

Temperatures have been rising in recent years. The ten warmest years measured since 1901 were all after 1989. Nature is reacting to this: animal and plant species that have established themselves in the Netherlands in the last century largely originate from warmer more southerly climes. Populations of cold-loving birds are declining, while warm-loving species are increasing. The periods in which plants grow and bloom and breeding seasons of birds are also moving forward.

Not every increase in southern species can be attributed to climate change. A number of newcomers prefer cities and industrial areas, as these built-up areas are warmer than the surrounding countryside.

Government using more herbicides

The government used nearly 54 thousand kilos of chemical herbicides and pesticides on public land in 2005. This is over one quarter more than in 2001. Herbicides accounted for nearly all this amount. The use of herbicides on paved areas such as footpaths and cycle paths rose by most.

Municipalities are the largest users of herbicides: they used

Municipalities are the largest users of herbicides: they used 37 percent more in 2005 than in 2001. For maintenance of paved areas the amount used even increased by half.

Companies double environmental investment

Dutch companies invested 655 million euro in environmental provisions in 2006, twice as much as is 2005. The energy sector was the largest investor in the environment, with 395 million euro. Generation of renewable energy accounted for a large part of this: 200 million euro was invested in new wind parks, for example.

The percentage of environmental investment in total investment also rose strongly in 2006, to 6.5 percent. Environmental investment by companies in manufacturing, mineral extraction and the energy sector as a percentage of total investment has not been this high since 1997.



14.10 Average daily temperature in De Bilt







14.12 Start of flight period for butterflies




14.13 Start of laying period for songbirds





Over 16 million people in the Netherlands

Just over 16.4 million people now live in the Netherlands. Older people are the fastest growing group in the Dutch population. There are now 2.4 million people aged over 65 years, 250 thousand more than in 2000. The growth in this age group is expected to pick up speed after 2010, as the post-war baby boom generation reaches retirement age. By 2030 the number of over-65s will have risen to 4.0 million

One in nine inhabitants is of non-western descent. The largest groups are those with a Turkish, Moroccan and Surinamese background. In the next 25 years the share of people with a non-western origin will rise to 14 percent, as the second generation – born in the Netherlands – continues to grow.

The number of singles will rise from 2.5 million in 2007 to 3.4 million in 2030. The number of couples with children, however, will decrease. The total number of households will increase by 1 million to 8.1 million in 2030.

Population growth doubled in 2007

Net population growth was 46 thousand in 2007. This is nearly twice as large as in 2006, when the increase reached a historic low. The stronger growth in 2007 was caused by higher immigration and lower emigration. As a result, the net emigration fell from 31 thousand in 2006 to 6 thousand in 2007.

Nearly 181 thousand babies were born in the Netherlands in 2007, just over 4 thousand fewer than in 2006 and 26 thousand fewer than in 2000. The main reason for this is that the number of women aged around thirty is decreasing. At 133 thousand, the number of deaths was also lower than in recent years, in spite of the continuing population ageing. Net natural population growth (births minus deaths) remained considerable at 48 thousand.

16. Prices

Inflation remains low in 2007

Inflation in the Netherlands was 1.6 percent in 2007. This was the fourth year in succession that it remained under 2 percent. In 2006 the average price increase was 1.1 percent. Compared with other countries in Europe, inflation is very low in the Netherlands. In 2007, lower prices for audio, video and computer equipment curbed inflation; Internet and telephone rates were also substantially lower than twelve months previously. The increases in prices of food and soft drinks were also smaller than overall inflation, at 1.0 percent. Meat was even slightly cheaper. Bread, cereal products and dairy products did cost a lot more than in 2006. Price rises for gas and electricity had a strong upward effect on inflation: they cost 5.0 and 2.9 percent more respectively in 2007 than in 2006. Consumers also had to pay a lot more for petrol than in 2006: 3.3 percent.

Factory gate prices rose by less than in recent years

Prices of products sold by the manufacturing industry were 4 percent higher than in 2006. This increase was smaller than in the two previous years. The largest price increase was in the wood industry. Prices in this sector were 9.3 percent higher. In the food industry, too, product prices rose by more than average, by 8.6 percent. Price increases in oil refining and the basic metal industry were limited, at 2.9 percent in 2007. In the previous year, prices in these sectors rose by more than 10 percent.

Prices of intermediate consumption rose by just over 5 percent in 2007. In 2006 the increase was twice as large. In the basic metal industry prices of intermediate consumption rose by 12.9 percent, while producers of food products paid just over 10 percent more for raw materials and semi-processed products.





16.7 Inflation



Fewer victims of frequently occurring crime

Twenty-six percent of the Dutch population aged 15 years and older reported that they had been the victim of frequently occurring crime in 2007. Two years previously this was still 29 percent. Fewer victims reported bicycle theft and other larceny offences in particular. Victim rates for violent crime and vandalism have remained fairly stable in recent years.

City dwellers are more likely to be affected by crime than people who live in rural areas. In the urban police-force regions of Utrecht, Amsterdam and The Hague, the percentage of victims was higher than the national average. In the south of the province of Gelderland, too, the percentage was higher than average in 2007. Zeeland had the lowest victim rate, at 19 percent. And inhabitants of Friesland, Drenthe and the north and east of Gelderland were also less likely to be affected by crime.

Lowest number of asylum requests since 1988

In 2007, 9,700 people submitted an application for asylum in the Netherlands. This is the lowest number since 1988, when 7,500 people requested asylum. The number of asylum applications shot up in the first half of the 1990s, to reach a record of nearly 53 thousand in 1994. After two to three years of decrease, the number doubled between 1996 and 1998, to start falling again after the turn of the century. In contrast with the rest of Europe, the number of applications rose slightly in the Netherlands in 2006.

Number of debt management plans no longer rising

Official debt management schemes were offered to 14,900 natural persons in 2007. This is the same number as in 2006. The number of natural persons declared bankrupt by courts fell by 12 percent in 2007, to just under 4,400. From 1999 to 2006 the number of personal debt management schemes and the number of personal bankruptcies rose every year. These increases have now apparently come to an end.







Retail turnover continues to grow

Dutch retail turnover was 3.7 percent higher in 2007 than in 2006. This is the second year in succession that turnover has risen, although the increase is smaller than the 5.3 percent of 2006. A larger volume of sales, in particular, accounted for the growth in 2007. Sales were 2.4 percent higher than in the previous year, while prices rose by 1.3 percent. Mail order companies and on-line retailers realised the largest growth rate, increasing their turnover by nearly 10 percent in 2007.


Supermarkets account for growth in food turnover

Turnover grew by 3.7 percent in both the food and non-food sectors in 2007. In the food sector, supermarkets accounted for almost all of the increase. Their turnover was just over 4 percent higher than in the previous year. Turnover in specialist food shops remained at about the same level. In the non-food sector, shops selling clothes and consumer electronics realised the largest increase in turnover. Both branches realised around 5 percent more turnover than in 2006. In other branches, too, turnover increased or remained about the same as in the previous year. Turnover growth in non-food levelled off in the last few months of 2007.

Hotels and restaurants continue substantial growth.

Hotel and restaurant turnover increased substantially again in 2007. It grew by 5 percent, just as in 2006. The volume of turnover was nearly 2 percent up, while prices rose by 3.3 percent. Hotels realised the largest increase in turnover. Business was down in pubs and cafés on the other hand: sales were 1.5 percent down, but as prices were 3.5 percent higher, they did manage a modest increase in turnover of 1.8 percent in 2007. Turnover growth slowed down considerably in the last two quarters of 2007. Cafeterias in particular suffered a setback. After a turnover increase of 11 percent in the first two quarters of 2007, turnover grew by only 1 percent in the second half of the year.

18.1 Companies in trade, hotels and restaurants by company size, 1 January 2007*







19. Traffic and transport

Cars cover nearly 14 thousand kilometres in 2006

The total yearly number of car kilometres continues to increase. An average car registered in the Netherlands covered nearly 14 thousand kilometres in 2006, 5 percent more than in 2000. Company cars in particular clock up large distances. Just over one in ten cars on Dutch roads are registered with a company. In 2006 these cars covered an average 26 thousand kilometres, 14 percent more than in 2006. Private cars drove substantially less, around 12 thousand kilometres on average.

Number of vintage cars doubled since 2000

Nearly 323 thousand motor vehicles in the Netherlands were older than 25 years on 1 January 2007, twice as many as in 2000. Just over six in ten of these vintage vehicles are cars. From 1 January 2000, the number of cars aged 25 years or older rose by 68 percent, to more than 204 thousand. The number of vintage commercial vehicles – vans, trucks, tractors, special vehicles and buses – more than doubled in the same period, to nearly 24 thousand. The largest increase was for vintage motorcycles. In the space of seven years the number tripled to over 95 thousand.

Sharp increase in passengers at regional airports

The number of passengers passing through Dutch airports continues to increase. It rose by one fifth to nearly 49 million from 2000 to 2006. Schiphol airport accounted for 46 million of these, 19 percent more than in 2000.

The strongest increase was reported by Eindhoven Airport. In 2006 nearly 1.2 million passengers departed from and arrived at this airport, nearly three and a half times the number in 2000. For the first time Eindhoven surpassed Rotterdam Airport, the largest regional airport up to then. A total of around 2.6 million passengers passed through regional airports in 2006, an increase of 74 percent on 2000.




